
HARVARD CAPS HARRIS







Field Dates: July 26-28, 2024



This survey was conducted online within the United States from July 26-28, 2024 among 2,196 **registered voters** by The Harris Poll and HarrisX.

Respondents for this poll are recruited through opt-in, web-panel recruitment sampling. Recruitment occurs though a broad variety of professional, validated respondent panels to expand the sampling frame as wide as possible and minimize the impact of any given panel on recruiting methods.

Results are weighted for age within gender, region, race/ethnicity, marital status, household size, income, employment, education, political party, and political ideology where necessary to align them with their actual proportions in the population. Propensity score weighting was also used to adjust for respondents' propensity to be online. The margin of error for the total sample is +/- 2.1pts.



% Who Say "Right Track"










How strong do you think the U.S. economy is today?







Do you think Joe Biden is improving as a president, getting worse, or staying the same?






Do you approve or disapprove the job that Donald Trump did as president?















If the congressional election were held today would you be more likely to vote for a...
























Do you approve or disapprove of President Biden's decision to step down as the Democratic nominee for president?

Do you approve or disapprove of President Biden's decision to endorse Vice President Harris to become the Democratic nominee for president?






Should there have been more competition to nominate a replacement to Biden, or was it important to show unity and coalesce behind Vice President Harris?

Which of the following statements do you agree with more: President Biden stepping down as the Democratic nominee...












Is Kamala Harris to the left or the right of Biden politically, or is she largely aligned with him?






Do you support or oppose open borders?






Are you for or against mandating the replacement of gas cars with electric vehicles?










Did the Secret Service perform adequately in protecting Trump, or did it perform inadequately and carry responsibility for the failure?

In your view, was Trump's reaction to being shot typical or extraordinary?










How strongly do you approve or disapprove of Trump's pick J.D. Vance as his running mate?






Did you have a favorable or unfavorable opinion of J.D. Vance's speech at the 2024 Republican National Convention?
















